I continue to be amazed by our TADL crew, it's wonderful to witness how they challenge themselves in using and expanding our resources to respond to the ever-changing needs of our community.

#### **Fall & Winter**

Recognizing the library as a community hub, TCLP installed four EV chargers in our southernmost lot at no cost to TADL. The Cherry Capital Cycling Club also donated a new Fix-It station, which we happily installed near our front entrance. On United Way Day of Caring a group of volunteers arrived to help us clean up the front lawns for winter.



As fall moved into winter our NEA Big Read program intensified, with events (collaborations with Dennos Museum), book discussions, and more. In partnership with Habitat for Humanity we delivered welcome bags of books to new homeowners on their move-in day.

TADL has many fall traditions we look forward to each year - including our inter-departmental pumpkin decorating contest! We also welcomed the return of other local traditions - and took part in the downtown Light Parade.




